The University comprises five colleges: Arts & Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering, Pharmacy and Law. Since our inception in 1871, we've been devoted to developing students who are ready to immerse themselves and progress to the next level in everything they do.

ONU has a rich history of academic excellence, and we're always evolving to meet society's ever-changing needs. We continue to be recognized for teaching quality, high graduation rates, commitment to volunteer service and, most impressively, providing a high return on investment for our graduates.

Location

Our scenic, safe and modern campus rests on nearly 342 acres in the village of Ada, Ohio. Our location provides a small-town atmosphere that complements the friendly environment found on campus. Ada offers an array of restaurants, shopping and culture.

Athletics

ONU competes at the NCAA Division III level as part of the Ohio Athletic Conference. There are 23 varsity sports (12 for men and 11 for women), and nearly as many club and intramural

sports, including esports. ONU has won a combined total of 17 OAC All-Sports Trophies. Our school colors are orange and black, and our mascot is Klondike the Polar Bear.

Student Life

Students choose from a variety of campus activities, including more than 200 student organizations; four national sororities and seven national fraternities; intercollegiate, intramural and club sports; music and theatrical events.

ONU Sustainability

Ohio Northern has made several significant strides in sustainability, and currently is making considerable efforts to realize the full benefits of a comprehensive approach in several areas of sustainability, alternative energy, and environmental stewardship.

- Two wind turbines generate 400 kilowatts of power and the 3MW solar array field reduces ONU's carbon footprint by over 3,300 tons, equal to 315 average households. Combined wind and solar generate more than 15 percent of ONU's annual electricity needs.
- Founders Complex and Affinity Village Complex feature geothermal heating and cooling system to reduce energy use and water consumption.
- Ohio Northern University is a 100 percent tobacco-free campus.
- ONU has been recognized as a Tree Campus USA by the nonprofit Arbor Day Foundation for over a decade.
- Four electric vehicle charging stations have been installed on campus.
- The Affinity Gardens project has transformed the green space of the residence community and provides produce for the Ada Food Bank and Beatitudes.
- 100 trees and shrubs have been planted near the wind turbines with a focus on providing a perfect habitat for 10 beehives.
- ONU Dining Services promotes a number of sustainability initiatives including these
 programs: "Green Container, Green Planet" program, "Skip the Straw," use of BPA-free
 recyclable tumblers, trayless operations, as well as celebration of WasteLESS Week
 and Earth Day events.




FIRST-YEAR CLASS PROFILE - FALL 2021







Parental Income For First-Time Freshmen by Income Category by Year







FIRST-YEAR LAW STUDENTS - FALL Median LSAT Scores For Entering Classes

National Percentile of Median Score





Ethnic Distribution








