

Tips on Effective Internet Searching

The following information is designed to help students use the web more effectively as part of the career search process.

DEFINITIONS

- **Boolean** type of search language or search operators used by most search engines and web directories. NOTE: See the list of Google Shortcuts (Boolean [Power] Search terms) on the back of this page.
- Search String a means of joining words together using symbols to refine the search.
- **Power Search** similar to using Advanced Search in any search engine; helps refine the search more so than may be possible using the Advanced Search option.
- **Peer Search** uses a person's name, business address, email address or phone number to locate additional links about the person, or it may locate similar people or peers.
- **Search Engines** search engines are huge databases that use spiders (tools that feed pages to search engines) to collect results. Search engines cover more of the Web's information and return more results but you won't always get the results you're seeking.
 - o Google always a safe bet for most search queries; you'll usually find useable results on the first page.
 - Yahoo also a good choice; finds results that Google does not necessarily pick up.
 - o Answers.com, BrainBoost, Factbites, Ask search engines that answer factual questions.
- **Meta-Search Engines** combine results from multiple search engines to search the broadest range of information; they return results from smaller search engines and directories.
 - Yippy searches Bing, Ask, Open Directory and Yahoo (as of 6/15/10)
 - o **Dogpile** Searches Google, Yahoo, Bing, and Ask.com (as of 6/15/10)
 - Make Your Own Meta-Search Engine Google Custom Search Engines (CSEs) focus on selected web sites within the Google database. A Google account or Gmail account are needed. Use them to focus on pages on a subject. Use the following limiter commands, followed by keywords focusing on your topic:

inurl:cse inurl:cx site:google.com anthropology inurl:cse inurl:cx site:google.com physics

- **Directories** collections of web sites organized by subject; covers only a small part of the web but the information is very dependable. There are two kinds:
 - Academic & Professional Directories created and maintained by subject experts
 - o Commercial cater to general public and compete for traffic

A comprehensive list of directories (both free and subscription) are maintained by Heterick Library; search the library's website under "Databases – Alpha & Subject Listing." Some favorites include:

- o Associations Unlimited for finding professional organizations related to your career choice
- Hoover's information on public * private companies world-wide
- **Deep Web Search** a means of searching for information that search engines and directories don't have direct access to; estimated at 500 times larger than what is searchable through search engines. Start BIG and narrow the search as you go by refining the search string; use Google Shortcuts on the back of this page.
